



LOCH AWE

The cottage is situated a 3 min drive or a 15 minute stroll from the banks of Loch Awe.

If you would like to access Loch Awe there is a little spot just before the Taychreggan hotel, after the large white house on the hill the road bends and straightens out, you can park your car and enter the water from here. This is the closest access to the house for water sports.

LOCH ETIVE

Airds Bay which is also nice for a gentle walk is a lovely spot for accessing the water.

You can also drive through Taynuilt to access Kelly's Pier which is at the far side of Arids Bay and backs onto River Awe.

TRALEE BEACH

Headed towards Oban take the Connel bridge and Tralee beach is around 8 min drive from there.

GREENACRE BAY

If you would like to access the sea there is a nice spot just outside Oban in Ganavan, called Greenacre Bay it's an idyllic spot and if you carry on down this road you will come to Ganavan Sands, another beach with a larger car park and toilets.



KILCHURN CASTLE

Kilchurn Castle is a ruined structure on a rocky peninsula at the northeastern end of Loch Awe. First constructed in the mid-15th century as the base of the Campbells of Glenorchy, who extended both the castle and their territory in the area over the next 150 years.

INVERARY


FORT WILLIAM

Kerrera is easily accessible from Oban, with regular ferry services running throughout the day.


ISLE OF LISMORE
